Don't let this happen to you

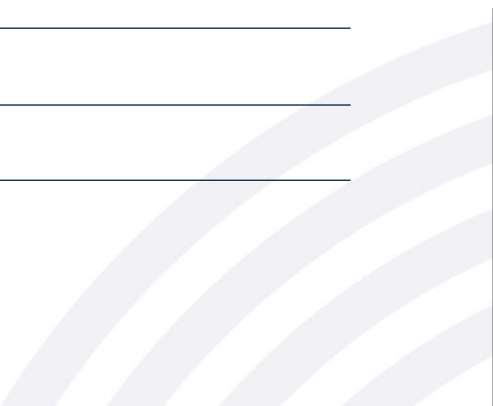
Use these activities to explore your skills and abilities.
