

The World of Work

The world can be a confusing place. When your mum and dad left school, they perhaps looked for 'woman's work' or 'man's work'. Lots of people still believe there is only one way to be a 'real man' or a 'real woman'. You have the power to determine who you want to be and how you want to live.

Your mum might have looked for work in one of the 'caring' professions. She might have taken a job she didn't like because she didn't expect work to play an important part in her life. She probably wouldn't have looked for a job on a building site.

Your dad had more choices open to him, but he probably wouldn't have looked for a job in a child care centre. The statements below are examples of gender bias/stereotyping

'Why would you want to do that? You're not a girl!'

'Looking after kids is women's work!'

'Real men don't cut hair!'

'What do you mean you want to become a dancer, boys don't dance?'

'You should get a real job, you're just dreaming!'

So what is stereotyping?

A stereotype is an oversimplified generalization about an entire group of people without regard for individual differences.

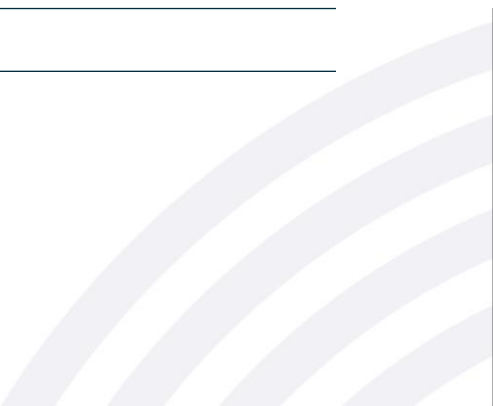
